BRITISH VIRGIN ISLAND

TORTOLA-TORTOLA

Day 1. Embarkation spot is usually Road Harbour in Roadtown at the West end of Tortola, the capital of the BVIs. After clearing in with customs, the cruise can finally start! First stop is the uninhabited Norman Island or also called "Treasure Island", situated in a national park with caves. The caves are a great snorkeling spot and famous for pelicans. The main anchorage is the Bight. From there, hikers can go ashore and make their way up to the top of the island. You can enjoy a dinner at the William Ts floating restaurant.





Day 2. After breakfast, the next morning stop is the Indians on Pelican Island, a beautiful snorkel spot for exploring the underwater world. But this is not enough. After a one hour stop, we continue to sail to Deadman's Bay on Peter Island with its dazzling white sandy beach for another morning swim and sunbath. After lunch, on the way to Cooper Island, another stop can be made right before Salt Island. In good weather conditions, guests can explore the famous ship wreck of The Rhone which sank during a hurricane in 1867, while snorkeling. Manchioneel Bay on Cooper Island is a safe anchorage for the night. After a swim at Cistern Point, a local dinner and drinks can be enjoyed at the Cooper Island Beach Club.

Day 3. The next stop is the Baths in Virgin Gorda. The Baths are natural cave formations, a geological wonder of granite boulders forming an awe-inspiring landscape at the edge of the beach with sheltered sea pools. There is enough to see, explore and enjoy for the whole day! For the night, the yacht will be safely anchored in North Sound, a huge bay well protected by its surrounding islands Moquito, Prickly Pear and Eustatia. A wide range of beach bars, restaurants, and the Bitter End Yacht Club provide anything from water sports, good food and relaxing.





Day 4. If the weather permits, we will visit the only coral island in the Virgin Island, Anegada, a blue-white paradise for snorkelers, scuba divers and wildlife lovers. You will be able to see a maze of coral reefs, tunnels and drops rich in fish, as well as rare rock iguanas and exotic birds on land. Once there, you will be able to go around the island by taxi since the surrounding waters are quite shallow

and dangerous to navigate.

Day 5. On our way to Marina Cay, we make a lunch stop in The Dogs, an excellent snorkeling and swimming spot. We will spend the evening in Marina Cay with its famous Pusser's restaurant or for more pampering we are able to stop also on Scrub Island Resort, Spa and Marina.



Day 6. Today we will sail to the island of Jost Van Dyke or also called the "barefoot" island. The island is the smallest in the BVI, with 300 inhabitants. There, guests can explore the old trails across the island and the East End's natural Jaccuzzi, a natural rock formation also called the bubbly pool. Great



anchorages are the White Bay with the famous Soggy Dollar bar as well as the Great Harbor with the famous restaurant Foxy's.

Day 7. After breakfast we will set sail to Little Jost Van Dyke. A beautiful tiny speck on earth and part of



the Diamond Cay National Park. The island is nesting ground for wild boobies, terns and pelicans. After lunch, we can make another stop in Sandy Cay, a deserted island before heading towards Tortola and grabbing a mooring ball at Soper's Hole for the night.

Day 8. We will sail to Trellies Bay which is right next to the airport. From there you have a 5-minute walk to the runway of the airport! Time to say Goodbye and make plans for another unforgettable sailing adventure in the near future!
